

Tie-a-thon 14 - Flies headed to Reel Recovery

South Bend, IN, Oct 23, 2019 - On April 18th, 2020, many avid fly tyers will come together to tie as many flies as they can for the great cause, Reel Recovery.

All the flies tied from the Tie-A-Thon 14 will be distributed to Reel Recovery, who help the emotional rehabilitation of men dealing with cancer.

Reel Recovery was founded in 2003 by a group of avid fly fishers, inspired by their fishing buddy's on-going battle with brain cancer. Witnessing first-hand the beneficial impact fly fishing provided their friend; they created Reel Recovery to provide the same opportunity for other men battling the disease. Combining expert fly fishing instruction with directed "courageous conversations," the organization provides men with all forms of cancer a unique opportunity to share their stories, learn a new skill, form lasting friendships and gain renewed hope as they confront the challenges of cancer.

The premise of the Tie-a-thon is like an old fashion barn raisin', with several tyers tying as many flies as the can for the cause.

Joining forces again this year to tie flies are members of: St. Joseph River Valley Fly Fishers, The Little Elkhart Chapter of Trout Unlimited, Duneland Fly Fishers, DuPage Fly Tyers (DRIFT), Flygirls of Michigan, Kalamazoo Valley Chapter of Trout Unlimited, The Brotherhood of the Jungle Cock; Reel Women, Reel Men of Indianapolis, Grand River Fly Tyers, Anglers of the Au Sable, and many more individuals tyers.

A bunch of tyers come together to tie 100 flies per person on a Saturday and at the end of the day, we try our very

best to surpass our previous all-time high of 15,500 flies.

If you are interested, pick just one pattern to tie, buy a box of 100 hooks, the materials and get tying! To get you through the day, Chef Terry Wittorp will have a spectacular lunch for all the tyers, worth at least 200 flies, but we will provide it to you for free!

Everyone is welcome, but please let us know so we can plan for lunch.

Also, so you're not too bored just tying, we will have a guest tier every other hour show off his or her special pattern. We will have a video system set up to view from your tying station. The Tie-a-thon will last from 9:00am to 5:00pm.

If you are not a fast tyer and can't complete your 100 flies in that time, this is a good time to get a jump on your flies. We would certainly take more than 100 from anyone if they are ambitious and want to tie flies in advance.

You don't have to be an expert tyer to donate flies. Many first time fly tyers have participated; this gives you a chance to become very good tying at least one fly. If you need help learning a pattern, contact Tim Scott, and he will be happy to give you a lesson or you can see many videos of flies being tied on the Tie-a-thon Facebook page.

Sow Bugs	14 - 18
Squirmy Worms	10 - 14
Wooly Buggers	6 - 10
